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

GENDER EQUALITY




PEACE, JUSTICE, AND STRONG INSTITUTIONS




PEACE, JUSTICE, AND STRONG INSTITUTIONS


CLIMATE ACTION

TAMU LOCHAR




Kumal Samaj, known for pottery and their Pangdure dance, faces modern challenges as their craft declines.
